

#### PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE



Committee Service: Over the past ten years I have had the opportunity to serve on or attend the meetings for most all of our Shelter Bay Committees. I have come away from those experiences with one consistent

thought: Boy isn't this Community lucky to have so many qualified and committed people serving us at Shelter Bay! Most recently I attended both the Finance and Facilities Committee meetings and was consumed with profound appreciation of the quality and dedication that the Committee Members bring forth to their tasks.

Our intent for Shelter Bay is to build a Community that is considered to be one of the most desirable places to live in the Pacific Northwest. It is the work of all our committee members that is making this possible. For those that serve, Thank You Very Much! For those of you who do not work on a committee, I invite you to consider doing so. It is so much more satisfying to be on the field in the middle of the action, then observing from the stands. You all have talents and experience that would be of value to this Community.

Communications: We recently lost Cheryl Westlake a valued Member of this Community and Chair of the Communications Committee. This is a Community of 2,000 Members and it is extremely important that we do the best possible job communicating with our membership. #### **Facilities Committee Message**



The Facilities Committee implemented several exciting projects last year among them the improvements to the walking path along Shelter Bay Drive, storage lot upgrade and tennis court resurfacing. These are projects everyone can see on a daily basis. Ones that many of us don't think about or are even aware of are equally if not more important. Shelter Bay owns and maintains a wastewater treatment plant, four lift stations and approximately 10 miles of sewers all of which are 50 years old. Last year ageing equipment at the lift stations, which were well beyond their normal life expectancy and were a maintenance issue, were replaced. Failure of any of these stations could have resulted in sewage overflows, water rationing, curtailment of service and fines from the Environmental Project

Agency.

This year we have several projects scheduled or in the planning phase. A and B docks were upgraded the beginning of the year. Constructed wetland and a walking trail are under construction. Drainage improvements to our ditches are ongoing. The next large project is the evaluation of our 50 year old water lines. Our drinking water comes from the Town of La Conner through an old steel pipeline under the Swinomish Channel. If this pipeline leaks or should a failure occur, Shelter Bay will be placed on immediate water rationing as our only other source of water is a small intertie with the Swinomish Indian Tribal Utility Commission (SITUC) system. Anacortes, from its 40 million gallon a day water treatment plant located behind Blade Chevrolet, provides both the Town of La Conner and SITUC water from twin transmission mains along Highway 20.

The volunteers on the Facilities Committee are an exceptional group of professionals that willingly give of their time and talents. This committee oversees the roads, water and sewer system, bank stabilization, storage lot, marina, harbor dredging, parks, pools, tennis courts and other facilities and amenities that make this a premier community in the northwest.

Exciting projects for this and next year are potential improvements to the upper pool, a dog park, Rainbow Park enhancements, walking trails, playground and roadways. We meet every second Friday at 8:00 am in the clubhouse. All are welcome to attend and we especially welcome folks that have a construction background, are engineers/ architects or planners that may want to join us or help with specific projects.

### **GLOT Committee Activity**

The GLOT Committee members have been extremely busy meeting twice monthly to address the multiple environmental and aesthetics issues driven in part by drought, continuous wind storms, ground saturation causing earth movement in residential areas, and overgrown greenbelt areas that have hindered access and presented a fire hazard to name just some of the issues addressed by your GLOT Committee. In addition, members have made themselves available to monitor multiple days of tree cutting and ground clearing, often during inclement weather, which at times required a rescheduling of planned activity. Precision Tree Service of Bellingham performed the work, working closely with Shelter Bay representatives to ensure that the services contracted for were delivered. They did a very professional job which included removal and cleanup of the serviced areas. Carole Miller, Chair and Susan Brown Vice Chair of GLOT did an outstanding job of scheduling, managing and liaison between Shelter Bay, Precision Tree Service, residents of cut & clear areas and the committee members to ensure that budget, work schedule, specified work and a host of other project management items were fulfilled.



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Another major ongoing project is the Skagit Ridge Plan. Committee member Jeff Lang has spearheaded this project, leading a sub-committee that includes representatives of the Skagit Ridge community to study the causes of ground erosion and possible slippage along the ridge. He organized, researched and developed a presentation that was presented to the Skagit Ridge community on December 12<sup>th</sup> that was well attended and constructive towards providing effective solutions to the areas affected. #### Regular Meeting of February 19, 2020

- 1) Adopted Resolution 20-01 revising the Facilities Committee Guidelines to increase the mission and scope of the committee, to provide it with the authority of a standing committee, and to change its name to the Facilities and Amenities Committee.
- 2) Adopted Resolution 20-02 revising Rules and Regulations, Part I, to clarify that the unauthorized use of Community facilities is a violation subject to the Schedule of Fines.
- 3) Adopted Resolution 20-03 providing for the continuity of governance in the case of an emergency or threat of an emergency during which the Board of Directors is unable to function in its usual decision-making capacity.
- 4) Accepted the Harbor Committee's moorage rate recommendations for inclusion in the draft FY 2020-2021 Budget being drafted by the Community Manager.
- 5) Tabled action on whether to make repairs and open the Upper Pool facility in time for the upcoming season to the regular Board Meeting on March 18, 2020.
- 6) Approved the Social and Recreation Committee sponsoring a Community-wide garage sale on Saturday, June 20, 2020.
- 7) Appointed Tom Madden and Bruce Romero as Alternate Members of the Facilities and Amenities Committee.

# Manager's Corner - David Franklin

Member's are Responsible for Their Culverts - With recent heavy and sustained rains, Shelter Bay's drainage system has been put to the test. Over the past year, close to \$80,000 in drainage projects have been performed throughout Community, which has improved the overall function of the system. With a few exceptions, the remaining issues with storm water drainage are isolated to Member improvements in the ditches such as culverts or river rock. If there is a culvert in the road right of way that allows you to access your lot, that culvert belongs to you, the Member. Shelter Bay did not install culverts when the lots were developed, this was the responsibility of the original sublessee or fee simple member. If the culvert is undersized or failing, it is the Member's responsibility to replace it at their own cost subject to the Community's approval process. In many cases, the same would apply to ornamental river rock. If you have a culvert that is failing, or other improvements that impede the overall function of the drainage system, you may receive communication from the Architectural Compliance Committee or Compliance Officer to take corrective action.

**A and B Dock Project** - The dock replacement project is complete, and boats are now being moved to their permanent slips. The Harbor Committee has been instrumental in the success of this project, working many hours on behalf of the Community. By installing new grating on the existing ramps and installing 88 dock boxes, this group of volunteers saved the Community well over \$20,000 in additional labor expense.

Moorage in the Marina is Going Fast - As reported last month, moorage for even small boats is going fast. The Marina's wait list is full for almost every slip length and we expect occupancy to be at 100% in April if not sooner. Call or come into the office if you are interested in a slip this year.

How to make Sense of the Dollars and Cents: Budgets for 2020-2021 - The Finance Committee and Manager have begun work on developing the budgets for next year. Through the years, we have made great efforts to encourage the members to become more involved in the budget process by holding a series of Finance Committee Workshops and Board Workshops. Despite our best efforts, Member interest in the process has consistently been limited to only a handful of owners. Please consider attending one or all of the scheduled meetings at the Clubhouse listed on the front page of this newsletter. If you cannot attend in person, please send correspondence regarding your budget thoughts to the business office or to my email at <a href="mailto:dfranklin@shelterbay.net">dfranklin@shelterbay.net</a>. In prior years, some Members have been disappointed when they attended the last meeting in the process, where the Board adopts the budget, only to feel disenfranchised because they could not suggest changes. Moral of the story: get involved early in the process if you want your voice to be heard. We hope to see you at these important meetings.

#### **Spring Ahead**

After the darkest winter on record for the Pacific Northwest, most of us are ready to welcome Spring, even if it means one hour less sleep in the morning by adjusting your clock ahead. Daylight savings time begins Sunday March 8<sup>th</sup> at 2:00am. Even though the Washington State Legislature and Governor passed a state bill into law last year to eliminate Daylight Savings Time, the United States Congress and President must approve this request for it to take effect. Unfortunately, there is no sign of any movement in this direction in the "other "Washington". Maybe next year.

#### TREASURER'S REPORT



<u>Finance Committee</u> – Soon we'll be involved in next year's (FY 2020-21) budget and we could use your help. The Finance Committee and Board meet with the Manager to review the upcoming budget proposal. You can either sit in on these sessions and be heard or apply to be a member of the Finance Committee. Check this Newsletter for budget work session dates/times. Applications for committee membership are available on-line or in the office.

At the Finance Committee meeting of February 13<sup>th</sup>, Ron Johnson, CPA, of Williams-Nulle, Auditor, presented their draft Financial Statements for the fiscal year ended last June 30<sup>th</sup>. Mr. Johnson stated the Community will be receiving an unqualified opinion, which is the best that we can receive. Of note, receivables decreased by approximately \$104,000 in FY 2019, operations came in very close to budget after considering the reserves applied to balance the budget last year to lower the assessment level. The Sewer and Lease budgets came in close to expected, Water fund had excess earnings of approximately \$21,000, Marina had excess earnings of approximately \$319,000 (reserved for future dock replacements), and the Capital fund had excess earnings being contributed to reserves for capital projects of \$640,000.

Staff reviewed the current Water Disconnect Policies and recommended some changes, which the Finance Committee approved. The proposal is to disband the use of the door hanger notices and change the delinquency letter, which is mailed certified, to make it clear when water disconnect will occur. So, all the pertinent information will be contained in the letter sent to the delinquent member. This recommendation will be heard by the Board at its meeting in April.

Impact of New Assessed Value of Marina – The Community is in receipt of an updated assessment notice from the Swinomish Tribal Community for the Marina for 2020, which will greatly impact expenses. The \$5 million increase in Assessed Value will add an additional \$62,000+ of taxes on the Marina for the 2020 tax year, ½ of this will impact the current year. Manager Franklin and Treasurer Slajer had a conference discussion with the Tribal Assessor and then the Board President filed an appeal with the Tribe. The next step will be to review the background material provided by the Assessor to support his assessment. This issue is very serious as the increase in assessment will greatly impact the available cash needed to secure a loan for the rest of the planned dock refurbishment.


New Marina Rates – The Harbor Committee recommended adjustments to the Marina Rates beginning July 1<sup>st</sup>. The Board concurred with these recommendations at its meeting on February 19<sup>th</sup>. The new rates adjust non-resident new dock moorage to 90% of that of Port of Skagit, increased old dock rates (F-I) by 2%, provides a 10% reduction for Shelter Bay residents, and provide the dock box fee be added to and included in the rate.

<u>Upper Pool</u> – The Facilities Committee forwarded to the Board information prepared by the Amenities Subcommittee regarding proposals and costs of reopening the upper pool on Memorial Day. The report did not contain some of the costs of operations so the Board would have a clear picture of capital and operating costs. As well, it was felt the membership should have an opportunity to be heard pertaining to the upper pool reopening. Therefore, this discussion was deferred to the March Board meeting.

#### WHAT TO DO WITH THE UPPER POOL?

Last year the Board of Directors included funding in this year's budget to close and demolish the Upper Pool facility due to its deteriorating condition and the amount of money needed to bring it up to par and to keep it safe and operational into the future.

This action was ratified by the membership with approval of the FY 2019-2020 Budget. Since then the Board has heard from numerous members, including a petition signed by 70+, asking that the Board reconsider that decision and re-open the Upper Pool.



There are numerous factors that the Board needs to take into consideration before making a decision on the future of this facility. Not the least of which is how best to expend our limited resources for the benefit of our membership. There has also been discussion of creating 3 new residential lots in this area, selling the subleases, and gaining the assessment income they would bring. The Facilities Committee has also studied the possibility of a new pool/recreation facility in the area of the Clubhouse, but again this would come at a cost with other projects vying for our capital fund dollars.


