Dock Notes – August 2022

BE WHALE WISE

Be Whale Wise is a coordinated effort between the U.S. and Canada with multiple commercial, non-profit and environmental non-governmental organizations, law enforcement and state programs dedicated to educating the public and raising awareness within the boating community.

Vessel noise and traffic impact the survival of southern resident killer whales. These whales — also called orcas — are listed as endangered under the federal Endangered Species Act.

As a boater or paddler, you can do your part to protect whales and keep yourself safe by following Be Whale Wise regulations, which include:

Stay at least 300 yards from southern resident killer whales and at least 400 yards out of the path behind or in front of the whales. <u>More information.</u>

Slow down to 7 knots within a ½ mile of whales.

Watch for and use the Whale Warning Flag, which helps notify other boaters of whales nearby. Slow down if you see the flag.

Turn off fish finders and depth sounders if you see whales in the distance.

Encourage positive behavior by reporting violators.

Approaching or trying to feed southern resident killer whales is <u>punishable by law</u> and carries a minimum fine of \$1,025, not including statutory assessments.

There's a app for that: The Whale Alert App helps you practice citizen science by providing a user-friendly tool directly on your tablet or smart phone that displays whale "safety zones." The app also allows you to report any live, dead or distressed whale sightings to the appropriate response agency.

Who's in Charge Here?

It's a good question as there have been changes over the years. Our long-time attorney, Philip Buri provided a short overview that should answer this question.

"Our Covenants do not exempt us from the oversight of local government. Way back when, Skagit County asserted it had jurisdiction over Shelter Bay. When the County realized it could transfer the responsibility to the Tribe, it did. We had increasing diffi-

culty getting the County to respond to anything – law enforcement, building permits, etc. The Great Wolf Lodge tax ruling drove the final nail and the County said the Tribe is the local government with authority over Shelter Bay.

As always, a homeowners' association must comply with all federal, state, and local laws and regulations, along with the Covenants. Since Shelter Bay is on the Swinomish Reservation, the Swinomish Tribe exercises governmental authority over the development."

It's important to understand that the Tribe currently plays two major roles for Shelter Bay. The first is that of landowner and holder of the master lease. The second is that of the local government. They are two very separate and very important roles for Shelter Bay Community.

NOTICE OF LAND USE ACTION

Proposal for Dock Easement expansion

Expansion of dock easements is a decision to be made by the Shelter Bay Board of Directors. The Board has established a public comment period from August 5 to September 5, 2022, during which members of the community can submit comments related to this proposal. This proposal has received conceptual approval from the Harbor Committee and the Architectural Control Committee (ACC). This project will require final review by Shelter Bay ACC, Harbor Committee, Board of Directors, and Swinomish Tribe.

The Board will consider this proposal at its regular meeting on September 21 at 4:00 pm.

Proposal Description

The owners of lot 862 desire to extend the existing dock to accommodate their future boat. To accommodate this dock expansion, it is proposed that the existing dock easement be extended westward by 26' and maintain the current width of 10'. This will result in 260 square feet of additional easement area. The dock will have geometry similar to the existing docks at lots 864/863, running parallel with the shoreline and staking line to minimize intrusion into the navigation channel. A full description of this proposal is available at the Shelter Bay office.

An Aquatic Land Use transfer fee of approximately \$2,000, based on Washington Administrative Code 332-30-133, will be assessed to the owners of lot 862.

Important Notice from the Swinomish Indian Tribal Community, Office of Planning and Community Development: A permit is now required whenever you are doing work that doesn't require an excavation permit, such as putting up a fence or planting trees or bushes. The "Tribal Historic Preservation Office (THPO) needs to know any time there is ground disturbance or digging within the tribal boundaries because there are a lot of archaeological findings throughout the reservation." The THPO permit is FREE, and its sole purpose is to make sure THPO is notified, and a tribal environmental reviewer can make sure that no other permit is required for your project. You Need to Know...

A GREENBELT is defined as: Any community common area, excluding those areas which contain permanent structures, drainage and utility systems, roads and road rights-of-way, golf courses, park areas, and storage lots.

Greenbelt Committee Guidelines read, in brief: 2. Violations will include but are not limited to the following:

- a. The cutting of any tree or limb over 4" in diameter will be considered unauthorized cutting.
- b. Unauthorized clearing is the cutting of any vegetation 4" in diameter or less.
- c. Dumping in the greenbelts (placing, parking, or storing of any items in the greenbelt). The natural distribution of natural greenbelt material is allowed.
- d. Placing any manmade object (i.e., as fences, storage sheds, tree houses, concrete pads, greenhouses, etc.) in the greenbelt.
- e. Placement of signs (requires permission).
- f. Political signs procedure.

You can find the full version of the Greenbelt Committee Guidelines on our website. Community members wishing to work in or maintain all or part of a greenbelt must submit a Greenbelt Maintenance Permit Form. Restrictions on what work can be performed will be stated on the Form. Forms may be downloaded from the website: www.shelterbay.net or obtained from the office.

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
