President's Message



Happy Holidays! I hope this finds you and your family well and enjoying the holiday season. In this season of gratitude and giving, I want to recognize the incredible efforts of our dedicated staff who continue to work hard in a challenging environment for the betterment of our community. I also want to recognize the time and energy spent by our 100% volunteer Board, along with volunteer committee members, who donate countless hours for the benefit of Shelter Bay Community. Thank you all for sharing your time and talent. I look forward to continuing positive efforts in 2023.

LEASE – Our consultants had a two and a half hour meeting on November 10th with Chairman Edwards, Brian Wilbur, and Tribal Attorneys - Stephen LeCuyer and Sydney Safley. Our consultants conveyed that Shelter Bay is interested in discussing a new Master Lease, but the terms will need to be sustainable for the Community, which means continuing work toward future agreement. The result of that meeting is Chairman Edwards will have a Senate meeting in the next few weeks to discuss terms of a new Master Lease and put forth a proposal from the Swinomish Indian Tribal Community to present to our consultants, who in turn will present to the SB Board. The Tribe has asked our consultants to do a series of educational videos for both Swinomish Indian Tribal Community and Shelter Bay. If the end result of negotiations is that the two parties cannot come to an agreement, then we will discuss Plan B, a transition plan to individual leases. The main takeaways from this meeting are a commitment by Chairman Edwards to work with the Senate to create a proposal and to another meeting with our consultants.

RAINBOW PARK – The replanting project is scheduled to be completed on December 15th. Please join us at 11:00 am if you are interested in assisting with the replanting. At 2:00 pm there will be a blessing and song presented by Kevin Paul, Master Carver, and member of the Swinomish Tribe.

TOWN HALL MEETINGS – Thank you so much to the 80+ people who attended the November Town Hall meeting at the Clubhouse! The Board appreciates you taking time out of your evening to come together for a Q&A session. We will continue to have Town Hall meetings the Sunday after board meetings. The next Town Hall will be January 22nd after the next board meeting on January 18th.



Dock Notes – December 2022

This community is amazing! Over ten years ago we decided to improve our marina with the intent of supplying income from new docks to offset lease cost for the community. To date we have exceeded all expectations for this project and, due to the financial success of the marina, are a year ahead of schedule. This couldn't be accomplished without community support and a huge group of volunteers.

We've reached the last phase of the project as scoops of mud are being dug to remove 40 years of sediment from our harbor. Dredging has a noisy impact on the community. Our permit and tidal conditions have mandated some unusual hours of operation. We appreciate everyone's tolerance and understanding despite these disruptions. It's fortunate that we've not needed significant dredging in the harbor these past 40 years and that the sediment being dredged has virtually no contamination. Most other communities like Shelter Bay have either several restricted access or are undergoing continual dredging to stay open.

Upon completion of this project our community marina will be able to meet market demand for larger slips, achieving higher income. When we started the project the marina's occupancy was just over 60% and now averages over 90%. Our marina employs one full-time harbormaster and a part-time harbor administrator. By comparison, our neighboring marina in La Conner, albeit larger and with a small RV area, has a staff of nine people.

Swinomish Tribal Cemetery Veterans Day **November 11, 2022** Each Flag represents a veteran



As of 2010, 29 Native Americans have been awarded the Medal of Honor, 51 Silver Stars – 47 Bronze Stars - 34 Distinguish Flying Cross and 71 Air Medals.

- 1) After Pearl Harbor in 1941, forty-four thousand of a total Native American population of 350,000 saw active duty, including nearly 800 women.
- 2) During WW I and WW II a variety of Native American languages were used to send secret military messages-codes that enemies were never able to break. In WW I, Choctaw and other Native Americans transmitted coded messages by telephone in their native languages. While not extensively used, the telephone squads have been credited with helping win several battles.
- 3) The Navajo Code Talkers recruited by the Marines are the most noted were not the only Native Americans used in WW II, however they played a critical part in the island-hopping battles of Guam, Iwo Jima, Saipan, and Okinawa. Again, the Japanese were never able to break their language code.
- 4) During the Vietnam War, 42,000 Native Americans served in the military, 90% were volunteers. Of those, 226 died in action and five received the Medal of Honor.

Manager's Corner

MARINA FACTS. DID YOU KNOW...

The Shelter Bay Marina Dredge and Dock Rebuild Project is well underway. After years of planning and execution during what could easily be considered trying times, (loss of two general managers for starters), the project will be completed in January 2023.

A marina is a high value asset due to the high demand for moorage and the fact that you can't build new marinas. For Shelter Bay, the basics are this; the Marina is not only self-sustaining but it makes money. It pays \$244,000 of the Master Lease payment annually. It also creates a surplus, which is then transferred to the Community each year. We welcome you to attend Finance Committee meetings for more details.

Like any asset, the marina has to be maintained in order to continue to be an asset. The Marina Dredge Project and Division Five Dock Rebuild must be done for the preservation of our asset and for the safety of our community. The 21-22 Board approved to use 50% of the cost out of Capital Reserves and the balance through a loan. There is still a loan that is in the process of being approved. The fact that the first bank we were working with pulled out due to the pending lawsuit meant that we needed to move on quickly with a different option. We are currently working with a local bank and are awaiting a marina appraisal that will take place the first week in December. After that, it is a matter of final underwriting. The bottom line is that even if the Marina loan did not happen, there is enough income for the Marina to pay back the Reserves (and without the added cost of interest) in a shorter time frame than the 10-year loan. It may reduce the Capital Reserves of Shelter Bay for a short time, but over the long haul, the marina income pays back the project costs, continues to pay the Master Lease payment, and still produces additional income along the way.

Walk to the Hats


October 6, 2022, a landmark day in La Conner, truly unprecedented and unlike any other in North America in the last 500 years. Jay Bowen explained that this walk from the people of Shelter Bay Community was the first of its kind: an Anglo-Saxon community walking on foot in humility to a native culture. Jay spoke to us about its significance.

We came to explore our neighbors at the Swinomish Channel, Swadabs Landing. We were elated to be met by members of the Swinomish Tribe: Tony Cladoosby, Eric Day, and Logan James. They gave us all a very warm welcome. It was uplifting and will remain in all the hearts of those who attended. We were welcomed, and it was expressed to us that the quality of our lives mattered to them. I can't think of a more loving thing to have been shared with us.

There were offerings brought from us. It was truly much more than a diverse group. It was a group that came in gratitude and curiosity. Jack McKenzie spoke about the past wrongs with an emphasis on doing right. He addressed it with true passion and sincerity. A giant spoonful of gratitude is owed to Jim Barrett and Jay Bowen, who coordinated the effort.

As we go forth, I think all that attended left with an intense sense of openness. We learned a native gesture for the spoken words, thank you. We left with more respect for mother nature, and to be better stewards of the land but, mostly desires for continued connection between communities in this time of great transition.



The series will continue with classes on, Shelter Bay Finances, Emergency Preparedness, Police, Fire and Safety topics.

You Need to Know...

Our AHAB (All Hazards Alert Broadcast) siren wailed on October 20 at 10:20 AM, as a test of the warning system. Many Shelter Bay residents heard the siren but couldn't understand the message that followed the siren or didn't go outside.

If you hear the siren (and remember that the monthly AHAB test is at noon on the first Monday of the month, is the Westminster chimes) then go outside to hear the emergency message. If you can't hear or understand the message then go to your cell for more information.

If your cell phone already receives and plays back Government alerts then you're ready. If you're not ready to receive alerts on your phone then here's what you do.

On your computer: go to https://mil.wa.gov/alerts. This download will guide you to setting up either IPhone or Android cell phones to receive Wireless Emergency Alerts and other earthquake and emergency information.




