Steve came aboard as part of the Marina Staff this summer. He will continue to assist with the Harbormaster duties through the winter.

Steve’s first job at 10-12 years old was picking strawberries for Due’s Berry Farm in Marysville, Washington. He later was a

lineman, cable splicer, and engineer. He’s been a guide for salmon and steelhead fishing, and was employed at Everett Police Department.

Steve has had a collection of boats: a Seaswirl, Jet Sled, Drift Boat, Wellcraft 33 Coastal, and a 29 Trophy. With this interest in boats and being on the water, his daily walk with his wife Linda past Vanessa Finch’s office led him to learn that she was looking for some help at the marina. Vanessa worked 7 days a week and needed help. Steve is now working Sunday-Tuesday for the summer months, and will work one day a week into the winter months, returning to three days a week in Spring.

His duties are refreshing the marina restrooms; collecting quarters from the shower, rolling them, and turning them over to the Shelter Bay Community office; walking the docks looking at safety issues such as securing dock lines; and watching for overhung vessels, usually due to a dingy being at the back of a boat. He pressure-washes the docks and maintains their integrity. He checks that each boat has their emergency contact card displayed on the dock side should an event occur requiring that he contact the owner.

In his leisure time, Steve enjoys salmon fishing. You will also find him out shrimping and crabbing. He likes to travel, as well.

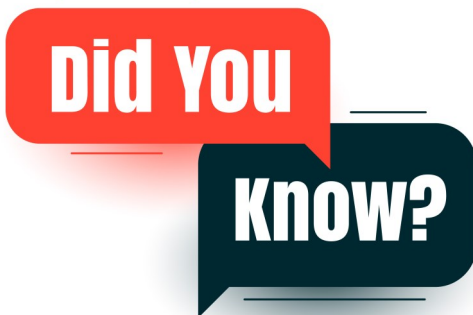
The committees bring reasoned recommendations to the board for discussion and final decisions. Board members have significant homework to do prior to the board meetings.

The board packets have the reports from the various committees. If a committee wants the board to act, it makes a recommendation to the board and gets it on the agenda for discussion and action. Please join a committee and help us to be the place we all want to live.

Speaking of that, I want to acknowledge the work done by a Finance Committee member who recently passed away. Jim Hanson was a member of that committee since 2010 and continued his participation even while using a wheelchair in his later years. I was privileged to attend his Celebration of Life Ceremony in September. His children and grandchildren gave glowing testimony to their times in Shelter Bay. Their expression of what is special about Shelter Bay and being on the reservation was truly inspiring. We are blessed.

Work on a new lease continues with the approval of an economist to update a sustainability index that was done several years ago. This is a tool that will be used to assess the affordability over time of a new lease. We are scheduled to meet with the tribal attorneys in early October to work on final details of the structure of the new lease. The momentum is still there to obtain a new lease as soon as possible. This process is overly complex, so working through the details takes more time than you would think. I think the final product will be worth the wait.

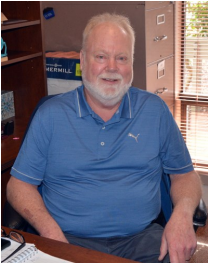

Community Manager's Report



Greetings from the Shelter Bay Community Office

In the past couple of newsletters, I have shared our ongoing efforts to get the pool operational. While we had thought we would be ready for an inspection during the month of September, we unfortunately ran into a few problems with some of the equipment. Those items are back in service, and we continue to pursue getting to the point where we can get the pool inspected for a temporary operating permit. We continue to push to reopen even if it is for a very short time prior to the fall and winter weather setting in. Last month I did ask for volunteers to fill the role of pool attendants, however we received very little response. If anyone may be interested in being a volunteer pool attendant, please contact the office at 360-466-3805 and speak with Jennifer.

Another amenity that we continue to work on is the update of the playground area. We have contracted with a firm to bring in new equipment and are in the final stages of planning to get the area updated in the next 30 to 60 days. In addition to new equipment, we will also be addressing the lack of proper drainage in the playground area. We are also looking into the possibility of repurposing some of the existing playground equipment and using it in other areas.

As mentioned in prior newsletters we had been short-staffed in the Maintenance Department with only 3 Staff members handling all duties previously handled by 4. We are happy to announce that we have added two additional Staff members in the month of September. This brings us to a total of 5 in the department being led by our Maintenance Supervisor Robert Vandeventer. We are confident that we will now be able to catch up on various maintenance related items that may have previously been postponed.

We recently had a firm come in and power wash all the Community Building roofs which has made a big difference in appearance. Now we are looking into potentially refreshing paint and a few other items to continue to keep things looking good.

I also want to thank Linda Shipley and all the Garden Club members for all the hard work they did around the clubhouse. Now that they have taken care of all the overgrowth and dropped leaves etc., the area is looking so much better. The entrances to the building are much more inviting for members and guests.

As always, I want to acknowledge all the staff that work here at Shelter Bay. They are a hard-working group of talented individuals that do their very best to serve the community. I also thank all the volunteers and committee members that contribute their time and expertise to help make Shelter Bay a great place to live.

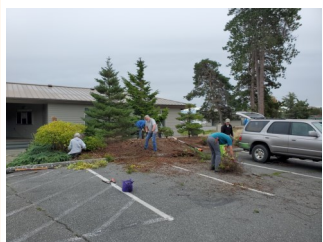

If you are a senior with a combined household gross income of \$35,000 or less, or disabled and receiving Social Security Disability payments, you are able to apply to the Swinomish Indian Tribal Community for a reduction in your Use & Occupancy Tax. This ANNUAL request must be in the form of completing the Exemption Claim Form. The due date is December 31st of the year prior to the year the taxes are due. You must have used your address as your Principal Place of Residence during the tax year in which the exemption is requested.

TSUNAMIS IN THE SALISH SEA:

Evidence from the past, future hazards, and tsunami safety

Tuesday, October 17, 2023, at the Clubhouse and on Zoom from 6:30-8:30 p.m.

In this class, we will explore geologic evidence of past tsunamis in the Salish Sea. We will learn about the longest record of tsunami deposits in Washington at Discovery Bay, and what this record tells us about Salish Sea tsunami sources. We will look at the last tsunami hazard maps published by the Washington Geological Survey and newly published tsunami guidance for the maritime community published by Washington Emergency Management Division. Lastly, we will discuss ways to protect yourself in the event of a tsunami.

Instructor: Dr. Carrie Garrison-Laney

Dr. Garrison-Laney is a tsunami hazards specialist at Washington Sea Grant, University of Washington, and liaison to the NOAA Center for Tsunami Research in Seattle. She studies evidence for past tsunamis and earthquakes, and does tsunami hazard outreach around Washington. While earning her PhD, Carrie studied tsunamis and sea level histories in the Salish Sea. She will offer tips to boaters who motor or sail in the Salish Sea on what to do in the event of a tsunami.

Kids Are Back in School

October brings darker mornings. Please watch out for children and give yourself a little extra time in the morning to get places as you may be caught behind a bus. Remember: Never pass a school bus when the lights are flashing as children are coming from both sides of the road.



Personal and traffic awareness

October brings darker mornings and evenings. The Safety Committee recommends if you are walking or cycling, wear brightly colored clothing or a reflective vest. Cyclists announce your approach to walkers (on your right or left) or get a ringer or bell for your bike. Walkers, cyclists, and drivers stay attentive. Avoid talking on your cell phone and pay attention to traffic. If you must use your phone, move over to a more protected area to complete your call. Drivers remember to pull off the road and turn off your vehicle to use your cell phone. Follow the speed limit of 25 mph on Shelter Bay Drive, 15 mph on Shoshone by the playground and tennis courts, and 20 mph on other streets.
