### President's Message



Since there was no Board Meeting in August and several Committees canceled their meetings, I don't have much to report on this month. August has been a very busy month for the Shelter Bay Staff. Please read Bill Palmer's article for a rundown of all their projects.

During my travels around the community, it was great to see people enjoying the good weather by being outside. Gardens were full of flowers and vegetables. My rhubarb is on the second cutting, and I've received lots of zucchinis, which complemented some donated crab. What a bounty there is in the

Skagit Valley. I also attended an outdoor dinner party with twenty Shelter Bay residents. I heard many comments about the friendships that had developed since moving to Shelter Bay. That has certainly been my experience.

Community Manager Bill Palmer set up a meeting with Mayor Marna Hanneman, Administrator and Attorney Scott Thomas, and Public Works Director Brian Lease with the Town of La Conner. A family emergency called Bill away, and Brian was on vacation. However, we held the meeting anyway. Lawson Earl, Project Manager, Ann Serwold, Executive Secretary to the Board, and myself met with Marna and Scott. The goal of these meetings is to share information on issues that collectively affect our communities. These meetings are very informal, and we have invited the Swinomish to join us moving forward. There is an essential connection between the Town of La Conner, the Swinomish Indian Tribal Community, and the Shelter Bay Community, and we hope to foster that connection through these meetings.

### Lease Update:

A meeting between Shelter Bay's lease attorney and our appraiser, as well as the Swinomish attorneys and appraiser, is scheduled for September. This group will work out details of agreeing on the value of leased land, and a method of proceeding if the parties can't agree. This is an important meeting. At an earlier meeting of the Shelter Bay and Swinomish lease groups, the Swinomish presented a term sheet with some proposed rental rates and other details. This was before the Shelter Bay lease group had developed a new lease structure and sought BIA comments. During August, the Swinomish requested a response to the term sheet. Shelter Bay has responded with a counter-proposal, which is under review by the Swinomish

The Board will hold its Annual Retreat in October this year. We look forward to working on the Community goals and sharing the outcome with you in the fall.

### Coquille Park Reconstruction Begins



Since the Board approved the plans to renovate the old (upper) pool house with volunteers doing much of the work, construction on Coquille Park has begun.

Once complete, the 20' x 30' building will include a 20' x 20' open room (for meetings, club gatherings, and family functions), a unisex restroom, interior storage (for tables, chairs, etc.), and exterior storage (for pickleball and other area activity equipment). There will be a kitchenette with a sink, and a water fountain (with a bottle filler) will be included. Some small appliances may be added later.

### **Community Manager's Message**



Greetings from the Shelter Bay Community Office.

**Pool Update**—The Pool will most likely be closed for renovation once this article is published. I want to extend a huge thank you to all those involved in getting the pool up and running this past summer. A big shout-out to our Maintenance Department and Project Manager for all their hours, allowing the pool to be operational for as many days as possible. It certainly received a significant amount of use, and we look forward to having an even better facility once the refurbishment project is completed.

**Playground update** – We are still awaiting final permit approval to begin the installation. Once all our paving projects are completed, we will focus on this important item.

**Coquille Park** – The old Pool building renovations have begun. At the time of this writing, most of the interior, siding, and sidewalks have been demolished in preparation for renovation of the building and surrounding area. This will include a new handicap-accessible bathroom along with other interior finishes creating a new space that can be utilized for a variety of events/functions.

Roads/Pavement – As I write this article, the Boat Launch parking lot is almost 100% complete, with all the major asphalt work and curbing finished. We still need to repaint the parking space striping and reinstall the curb stops. We have also been working on some of the roadways deemed worst in the most recent road assessment, which should be completed by the time this newsletter comes out. The next big paving project is the Marina parking lot by C & D docks. The paving company has also taken care of various road patches due to prior water leaks, etc. Our Project Manager will also be in contact with PSE regarding some work they previously did on Wanapum that we believe caused some of the water flow issues we have there during the wet season. We are working hard to complete this before returning to the rainy months. Our goal is to eliminate this once and for all.

**Roadway Line Painting**—As most of you have probably noticed, we have begun the line painting and should have most of this done by mid-September, including the fog lines. As previously mentioned, in addition to paint, we are also applying reflective beads with the paint to make it easier to see at night.

Maintenance Department – August saw several water leaks that our team jumped on as quickly as they were identified. As a reminder, in some instances, due to the nature of the break, we may have to issue a boil water notice to affected properties. When this occurs, we must take a sample into the lab to ensure the water is safe to drink. This testing typically takes up to 72 hours before we receive results from the Lab. We strive to update information as quickly as possible. Please note that in order to receive these notices, you need not opt out from receiving the notices. If you have not been receiving notices or are uncertain, please contact the Shelter Bay office, and one of the staff members can assist you in ensuring you are set up correctly.

Golf Course/Greenbelts/Ditches – With the addition of a summer staff member, the golf course area was given more attention, and the entire course looks much better, with most of the long grasses being attended to. Last month, I mentioned we were working on golf course irrigation, and we just recently replaced a number of our sprinkler heads that were not functioning properly. We will also focus more on greenbelt areas to ensure we stay on top of those. Lastly, the company that does our ditch mowing visited at the tail end of July and could only do a portion of the ditches due to their already full schedule. We are actively working on getting them back in as soon as possible to complete all of the others and to make another pass on those previously mowed.

As always, a big thanks to all our dedicated Staff members, the Board, and all our committee members for their ongoing efforts to ensure Shelter Bay is a great place to live.

### From Your Rules Committee - Political Signs

It's election season again, and with it comes the always-asked question about allowing political signage. Members should familiarize themselves with the <u>Shelter Bay Rules and Regulations</u>, <u>Part 1</u>, Section 11.3, regarding signage, before calling the office. All governing documents are available on the website.

Political signs may be displayed for candidates running for political office and/or ballot issues in any election in which all members of the community can be eligible to vote. Political signs shall be limited to one sign per candidate and per issue, shall be placed within the boundaries of the lot, shall not exceed 2' by 2' in size, and shall be attached to the structure or on a post not over 4' high. If attached to a post, the sign shall be located within the boundaries of the lot and located in such a manner as to not obstruct the view of the roadway. Political signs may not be posted in a greenbelt area.

As a reminder, political signs may be posted up to four weeks prior to the election (October 8 or after) and must be removed within 48 hours after the general election (by November 7, 2024).

### **Rainbow Bridge Lighting Update**

Rainbow Bridge is the most significant feature of the visual character of the Town and Shelter Bay community. For those of us who are privileged to live here, the lighted Bridge signifies "Home."

The Shelter Bay "Light Brigade" has been formed to fund the permitting, installation, and maintenance of lights on the south side of the Bridge in partnership with the Town of La Conner. Employing the same process and technology used by the Town, we can create a unified look for the Bridge, reinforcing the close bonds between Shelter Bay and the Town.

We have received \$7,000 in pledges to date, and we thank our partners. In our push to reach the funding goal of \$13,000, we seek your financial support through our "pledge now, pay later" process. Pledges now will demonstrate support in our negotiations with partnering agencies, and payment later (probably November) will fund the permitting and installation.



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
