Compliance Corner



Hey Shelter Bay! I hope the new year is treating you all well. There are a few reminders I want to share this month... **Outdoor burning**

As spring comes around, I want to remind the community that we have a year-round burn ban. This includes the burning of weeds. As convenient as it may be, burning weeds runs the risk of starting a fire, which has the potential to escalate quickly. I'm sure we can all appreciate the risk of wildfires, and why we

desperately want to avoid having one here in Shelter Bay. Any outdoor burning will be met with a \$500 fine from the Compliance Officer.

Off-leash dogs

As I drive through the community, I have noticed there are an increasing number of dogs off-leash. This is a reminder to the community that dogs are required by our Rules & Regulations to be leashed at all times. Although it may seem silly, this is for the safety of our community, both humans and animals! Unleashed dogs can bite humans or other dogs, cause residents to fall down, and cause larger issues if another reactive dog is present. Martha's Beach is an open and off-leash area. Having your dog unleashed anywhere except Martha's Beach will result in a warning, and subsequently a \$100.00 fine.

Certificates of Compliance

Spring is around the corner, and I know many residents will begin doing projects around the house! This is a reminder to please make sure you obtain a Certificate of Compliance for the work you are doing. For example, if you are: doing a major or minor remodel; building a fence or deck; building new construction; repainting; reroofing; building a private dock; installing solar panels; installing a propane tank or heat pump, you will require a CoC. Working without a Certificate of Compliance can and will result in a fine. Please avoid this by going through our required processes! Feel free to call the office and inquire if you have any questions.

Budget Development Meetings

Our fiscal year starts on July 1, and this is the time to start creating the budget for Fiscal Year 25-26. The process starts with the Operations Budget, then moves to the Capital Projects Budget, which is heavily based on the current year and drafted by the Manager. The Manager will provide a draft to the Finance Committee and the Board of Directors by Monday, March 3. In the following weeks, three budget development meetings are scheduled to review and revise the draft.

These meetings will be held in the Clubhouse and via Zoom and are open to all community members. There will be a Town Meeting in April for the final Community review and input. Community Manager's Message



Playground – Currently working on putting together a meeting between us, the planning department, and our wetland specialist. The goal is to finalize an acceptable plan that will allow us to place the new equipment in the existing playground area. I anticipate having this completed sometime in the Spring.

Pool Update—Due to the weather, work on the pool remodeling project has slowed down a bit. Once

things warm up, we hope to get back on track with concrete work on the pool deck, sidewalks, and patio. We will then move on to various other parts of the project, including pool plastering, tiles, ladders, fencing, etc. Striving to have this completed as soon as possible, we will continue to provide updates as the project progresses.



Marina—Harbormaster Derek Woods and Steve

Shipley have been working on various projects at the Marina. They have thoroughly inspected all the electrical connections to ensure they are operating properly, addressing issues as they are identified. The Harbormaster recently obtained pricing on the remaining escape ladders needed, and we are placing the order. These will be installed over the next few months. They are also monitoring all the water connections to ensure we keep leaks to a minimum due to the cold temperatures we have been experiencing.

Roads/Pavement—Work on the Wanapum water flow issue has been completed. The French drain that was installed appears to be working quite well. We will continue to monitor this. Once we are confident the problem is resolved, we will consider repaving portions of the area sometime in the spring. We are currently working on paving plans for spring, as well as budgeting for the 2025/2026 fiscal year.

Maintenance Department—The team will start installing the drive-by water meter tops sometime in early February. They recently finished work on the new fencing at one of our porta-potty/trash enclosures on Shoshone Drive, and will soon be redoing the fencing around the porta-potty at Rainbow Park. They plan to install stop signs in various areas that are missing them, and will paint all the signposts during the spring and summer months.

Golf Course—We are planning to work on the greens this spring, including aerification and top dressing, to improve their health and playability.

Coquille Park – Progress on remodeling the old pool building at Coquille Park continues, with most of the exterior work completed. With the recent weather that we have experienced, the work is currently focused on the inside. Again, a huge thanks to the community volunteers who have been working on this project. We look forward to the completion of this project. We will have a new facility that will provide a handicap-accessible restroom, storage, and a large open room reservable as recreational space that will be available to the community.

As a reminder, we always seek additional folks to join our SBC Committees or to volunteer on projects such as the Coquille Park Building. As always, my sincere thanks to all our awesome Shelter Bay Staff members. The team worked diligently in 2024, accomplishing a wide variety of projects, and we look forward to continuing that in 2025.

Board President's Message



I spent a few weeks in Australia during the holidays. I've heard Shelter Bay Community is also a good place to be. It's a little crisp as I'm writing this. The outside thermometer says 28 degrees, but it's clear with Mt. Baker in sight.

The news has been full of fires in the Los Angeles area. You might wonder if that could happen here. We live in a forest, and if the Community and the homeowners don't do their part to reduce the risk of fires, we could face a loss due to a fire. We are engaged in once again becoming a Firewise Community. This effort will reduce materials fueling fires and educate homeowners on keeping fires

away from their property.

During January, Communiversity presented a talk on the operation of Fire District 13. The information in that presentation will help you understand how the Fire Department responds to fires and emergencies here in Shelter Bay. This presentation by Captain Ted Taylor was recorded and is available on the Shelter Bay website. Click here to view the video.

It's budget preparation season, and the committees and staff are putting together the fiscal 2026 budget. Please watch for the announcements for the budget review sessions so you can participate in the process.

I want to mention that we are losing a community member who has been an outstanding volunteer and a fellow board member. Pat McGarry headed up the rebuild of our Marina and acted as interim Community Manager, besides being an active Harbor Committee member. He and Carol are moving to Florida to enjoy a warmer climate. I am very pleased to announce that Julie Peddy will fill Pat's board position. Julie was the alternate chosen in last year's election. Julie has been the Chair of the Green Committee.

Finally, the New Lease Update: It seems like November, December, and January have not shown much progress. Our lease group met almost once a week during that period but could not have joint meetings with our Swinomish counterparts. Their schedules have kept them from meeting with us. We do have a meeting scheduled with their appraiser and our appraiser for January 30th. This will hopefully lead to a series of meetings to move forward on other important issues. I am hoping to have a joint statement from the Swinomish Tribe and Shelter Bay Company on items we agree upon in February.

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A Word from your Safety Committee

The Shelter Bay Safety Committee has posted a Safety References document - a list of safety-related contacts, applications, and resources - on the Shelter Bay website's Committees page under Safety Committee. The list contains two documents you should all print out, study, and keep close at hand:

- 1) the evacuation routes out of Shelter Bay, and
- 2) Ready, Set, Go, a self-assessment for a Wildfire Action Plan.

Now is the time to prepare for fire season. Prepare your home before a fire, and know how to evacuate Shelter Bay if necessary.

Other resources in the document include the telephone numbers of safety-related agencies in the community, official information on emergency planning, and applications you can download on your phone that provide valuable real-time information in the event of a fire or other emergency in the community.

Additional resources will be added to this list as they are identified.

Chorus Singing Opportunities

Shelter Bay Chorus begins its 40th season of singing and performing concerts locally and in the broader Skagit Valley area. Rehearsals are held each Thursday (4:30-6:30) in the Shelter Bay Clubhouse, beginning January 16. Concerts are planned for early May.

Though participation is primarily from Shelter Bay, this group is a community choir open to all in the area who enjoy choral singing, regardless of previous experience. The song selection varies widely, though the fall session is focused on traditional and contemporary Christmas and holiday music. The spring program usually includes a variety of styles and genres of choral music and is often built around themes. This spring's repertoire is presently in the planning stage, with several of the songs expected to be from popular Broadway musical favorites, both older and more recent.

Singing is undoubtedly a joyful experience but also a very healthy brain activity due to its complexity. Our brain simultaneously perceives tones, timbre, pitch intervals, melodic contours, harmony, and rhythm and manifests itself emotionally and physically. Singing simultaneously engages many muscles as we reproduce pitches and rhythms, listening carefully to blend our sounds with other singers, reflecting dynamics (louds/softs) while reading the lyrics, and following the musical notation (note reading). Though complex, relying on each other to create beautiful music is an exhilarating and exciting endeavor.

Weaving a Landscape of Togetherness



When women come together with common interests, good things happen! Winter is a very active month for women weavers in the Swinomish Tribe. They spin wool to make all kinds of gorgeous clothing, from boots to purses, blankets, wedding shoes, vests, and more. It is a handicraft that goes back into their bloodlines and is a skill set taken very seriously, just as knitting is. I once heard an endearing story of an elder whose knitting needles were handed down for generations and between families. They became lost at some point and emerged into another family a few generations later. The needles reappeared! These special knitting needles were much larger, a size you don't see much of today.

Carol McGarry of Shelter Bay is also a weaver who has spun much of her wool from angora, rabbit fur, alpaca, and other wool. She made a lovely donation of her hand-spun wool to the Swinomish. It was important to her that it would go to a skilled weaver who would appreciate Carol's efforts, and sure enough, it did. It was an excellent opportunity to learn about what types of projects the elders are working on and how to go about it. As I said, much can be cultivated when women come together to share their skills, knowledge, and experience.

We can grab a little inspiration from the Swinomish. The members are coming together for several seminars on low-carb cooking. There are nearly 1 in 5 people in the U.S. affected by pre-diabetes/diabetes, and native people are 2.5 times more likely to suffer because of this disease.

Madeleine Volum hosted a very low-carb healthy brunch, and we had the great fortune of a tribal member joining in. Coming together as a whole community to support healthy habits is one of the most important things we can do as a community and for our longevity. Modern times and food can creep up on all of us, and making healthy low-carb choices can be easier than you think, especially when we come together to help one another. Here's to happy and healthy habits that enrich us all!
