New Coquille Park Clubhouse Grand Opening

The big day has arrived! Our new clubhouse has officially received its certificate of occupancy and will be ready for enjoyment by our community as soon as the board finalizes usage rules.

Brief History

The upper pool was permanently closed in 2019 when it became too costly to repair and maintain. (The rebuilding that would have been necessary to meet codes would have exceeded one million dollars.)

In early 2023, then—board member Louise Kari asked Peter Volum to explore alternative uses for the site. A task force was formed, which, after conducting a survey and reviewing many options, recommended:

- Converting the former tennis court into four pickleball courts.
- Upgrading the half-basketball court.
- Repurposing the old pool house into a second, smaller clubhouse with volunteer help instead of demolishing it.

The first two suggestions were immediately approved and implemented. Volunteers from the pickleball groups and other members of the community performed much of the work.

Ric Henderson prepared the plans for the pool house conversion and secured bids. Construction began upon approval by the board.

A True Community Effort

The project was overseen by Alan Dietz, who assumed the role of project foreman and primary worker with the invaluable help of many other volunteers, including:

Community Manager's Message



Pool – The pool was well-used this summer and we hope you all had a great time. We will soon be shutting down for the season. While it could potentially be kept open longer, it is cost-prohibitive due to the amount of propane needed to keep it heated. We did learn a few things this summer; we will be making a few changes to umbrellas and a few other things once we get into spring to ensure we are ready to go for the next swimming season. There are still a few items left to be done surrounding the pool area, including the clubhouse stairs and the wheelchair access ramp. All of these will be completed sometime soon.

Playground — As reported in prior months, due to a change in the size of the wetland buffer, we've had to put together a new plan that will allow us to install the new equipment in a part of the playground that sits outside the

enlarged buffer. We have drawn up plans and hope to submit those to the permitting department sometime soon. We will share updates as they are available.

Marina – Occupancy continues to be high, coming in at 94% for June and 93% for July. This allows for strong financial performance. Derek and Steve continue to tackle various jobs related to the ramps and docks. They also do work around the harbor master shed and bathroom area. Improving the median area in the marina parking lot is on their planning list. All these things continue to add curb appeal to the entire marina operation.

Maintenance Department – Now that the department is fully staffed, we expect to get various items completed at a much quicker pace. As previously reported, we have two staff members who will be taking their sewer certification test very soon. Assuming one or both pass, we will then be able to eliminate the company that we currently use in lieu of having the required second certified individual on staff. The team stays busy working on various issues throughout the community. The work on the drive-by water meters is going well. Approximately 70% of the tops are now installed and ready to be used for drive-by reading instead of manual reading. The other 30% will be completed very soon. The installation of full meters will begin soon after.

Roads/Pavement— Several paving projects have taken place over the last couple of months. These included a large section of Klamath Drive, a portion of upper Shelter Bay Drive, areas by the Shelter Bay entrance and the RV lot, and a few other roads and other smaller areas. Please note that asphalt projects will be undertaken as needed, and we have secured the necessary capital funding. We encourage you to report any road issues to the office, so we can review and address them. We still plan to sweep the roads and repaint the lines. That task was delayed a bit due to some challenges with the line striper. We plan on completing this in September. The work on the potholes on the outbound side of the main entrance is still in the works and should be completed very soon.

Coquille Park Building - The remodel of the building at Coquille Park has been completed, with just a few minor details left to be taken care of. Again, huge thanks to the volunteers who gave so much of their time to complete this project. The area surrounding the building was hydroseeded, and the grass has sprouted. The Garden Club did some great landscaping work in the front of the building, giving it a much more finished and inviting look.

Volunteers – As always, we recognize all the time and effort that Shelter Bay volunteers put in on committees, on projects such as the Coquille Park building, and on various other things. Our sincere thanks for all you do. The Shelter Bay community is fortunate to have so many folks who are dedicated to making Shelter Bay a wonderful place to live. August 8: The fence line was tidied up.



projects. There are fines for not getting an approved C of C to complete your projects. These fines are scheduled to be enforced by the ACC committee starting on January 1st.

Paving is done weekly, and street striping will proceed as work advances.

The last item I would like to address this month is the code of conduct for members of Shelter Bay.

1.2 Member Conduct:

a. Members, tenants, and guests shall use courtesy and respect in their interactions with others. Members shall not engage in any abusive or harassing behavior, either verbal or physical, or in any form of intimidation or aggression directed at other members, residents, guests, committee members, or the Shelter Bay board of directors or employees. Verbal abuse or physical harassment is unacceptable behavior.

b. It is the responsibility of each owner to ensure that they themselves and their tenants and guests comply with Shelter Bay's conduct policy. Failure to comply may result in a fine recommendation to the Rules Committee.

Please be mindful of the rules and ensure that you treat your neighbors, volunteers, and staff members with courtesy and respect.

Fire District 13 News

As a longtime resident, I want to share why I am supporting the upcoming levy lid lift for Skagit Fire District 13 in November. Over the years, I've seen firsthand how important our fire district's services are—not only during emergencies, but also in the day-to-day support they provide to our community.

When a medical emergency happens, minutes matter. Thanks to Fire District 13's commitment to 24-hour, 7-day-a-week staffing, help is always available. Here in Shelter Bay, we benefit from fast response times. For those of us who are older or have neighbors and family members with health concerns, that speed can truly mean the difference between life and death.

I also want to highlight the Good Morning 13 program, which checks in on residents who live alone or may need a little extra reassurance each day. This service provides a lifeline for many of our seniors, making sure that if something goes wrong, help will be on the way. That kind of care and attention is rare, and it's something worth protecting.

Like everything else, the fire district is affected by inflation. Costs for fuel, medical supplies, protective gear, and training have all gone up significantly in recent years. What used to be covered by the old levy no longer stretches as far. Our fire district has never increased the levy lid before, and, without this adjustment, Fire District 13 risks falling behind. That would affect response times, staffing, and the equipment our firefighters and EMTs rely on to keep us safe.

I know that none of us like paying more taxes, but I also know that when it comes to health, safety, and peace of mind, this is a worthy investment. Supporting Fire District 13 means supporting our neighbors, our families, and ourselves.

This November, I encourage all Shelter Bay residents to support the levy lid lift. Let's make sure the people who look after us have the tools they need.

Rainbow Bridge Lighting Update—September 2025

Rainbow Bridge is the most significant feature of the visual character of the Town and Shelter Bay community. For those of us who are privileged to live here, the lighted Bridge signifies "Home." The Shelter Bay "Light Brigade" has been formed to fund the permitting, installation, and maintenance of lights on the south side of the Bridge in partnership with the Town of La Conner.

Next Steps

We will be asking the Board for preliminary approval for a survey to evaluate the support for the project. While many are very interested in a low level of lighting for the bridge, there is also a desire for dark skies in Shelter Bay. In addition, the lighting project will require a maintenance commitment from the Community, which must be voted on by the Board. Once the survey results have been tabulated, I will present the findings to the Shelter Bay Board for discussion of the maintenance cost and "dark sky" issues, to obtain community approval for the project.

Dock Notes



September in the Pacific Northwest: the secret season for savvy boaters! Escape the peak summer crowds and discover the joy of cruising with predictable breezes and ample sunshine. The mild temperatures and clearer skies make it an ideal month to embark on those unforgettable voyages, particularly among the scenic San Juan Islands.

Long-Term Parking: We kindly request the cooperation of all marina tenants regarding our parking policy. If your vessel will be away for longer than 72 hours, including those moored at F-J docks, please park in the long-term parking area, located in the center of the main marina parking lot. This helps us ensure sufficient space for tenants with shorter absences. To avoid congestion and maintain accessibility, please do not park near the Annex Building (Library). The Annex is used for a meeting place and offices, and its parking spots shouldn't be used for long-term marina parking.

Marina Parking Lot Garden Beds: Beginning in early October, our team will be clearing the garden beds in the center of the parking lot. This project involves leveling the beds and removing tree stumps that are currently buried beneath the beauty bark, ensuring a smoother and more visually appealing space.

2026 Registration Audit is Done: To ensure compliance with marina rules and regulations, all vessel owners must display current vessel registration. If your vessel's registration is not yet displayed, a reminder call will be made to facilitate compliance. Please note that failure to display the current registration can result in fines and penalties.

Non-compliance fines start at \$100: Fines are assessed to tenants who have not provided the office with current Washington State registration documents or are not displaying 2026 registration decals on their boat. Failure to provide current insurance or display Emergency Contact cards may also result in a fine.

Pickleball Tournament a Great Success






Last month's pickleball tournament at Coquille Park was a tremendous success.

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
