# Breaking News Disc Golf Now Open in Shelter Bay





Come and try it out! A few discs are provided, but you're encouraged to bring your own.

The rules of disc golf and how you play are similar to traditional golf, but using discs instead of balls and clubs. Here are a few simple instructions to get you started:

- One stroke is counted each time the disc is thrown.
- The goal is to play each hole in the fewest strokes possible.
- The player with the lowest total strokes for the entire course wins.
- On our course, each hole is par 3.
- The distance to the next basket is on nearby park benches, sometimes including directions for the basket location.
- Each of the nine holes begins with a tee throw. This is done from the current tee boxes that golfers use.
- The player with the least number of strokes on the previous hole is the first to tee off on the next hole.
- After everyone has teed off, the player whose disc is farthest from the basket always throws first.
- A disc that comes to rest in the disc basket or suspended in the chains constitutes the successful completion of that hole.

#### The most important rule: "The one who has the most fun wins."

#### **Community Manager's Message**



**Pool** – We hope everyone enjoyed using the pool this past summer. As previously mentioned, there are still a few items left to be done surrounding the pool area; those items will be taken care of well before we get into the next pool season.

**Playground** — The board has approved the revised plan to install the new equipment in a part of the playground that sits outside the enlarged buffer. We still need to submit this updated plan to the permitting department and hope they will approve so we can get started sometime soon.

Marina – Occupancy continues to be high, coming in at 93% for August. Derek and Steve continue to tackle various jobs related to the ramps and docks. The marina bathroom roof was recently completed; we are now creating the scope of work for the interior renovation and will be soliciting bids soon. We are also working on cleaning up the parking lot area.

Maintenance Department – Congratulations to staff members Larry and Caleb who recently passed the sewer certification test and are now certified. This allows us to discontinue the use of an outside company to fill that need, which will save the community several thousand dollars per year. Work on the drive-by water meters continues. In late August we had an onsite meeting with representatives from Badger and Beacon to learn more about performing the drive-by water meter reads. After the meeting, the Badger and Beacon reps, along with a few maintenance team members, did a test read of the approximately 180 meters that are fully installed. They were able to do the reads in about 15 to 20 minutes. This will be a huge time-saver, and will allow those hours to be used working on other items.

**Roads/Pavement**— Many paving projects were completed over the last few months. We are winding down for the season; we will start back up in spring. We encourage you to report any road issues to the office so we can review and address them. We will be sweeping the roads and repainting the lines very soon.

**Coquille Park Building** — With the building remodel completed, we are in the process of getting furnishings, AV equipment, and signage.

**Golf Course** – As reported by our project manager Lawson Earl at the September Board meeting, plans are coming together for various turf improvements to the golf course greens during the off-season. These will include aerating, sanding, compacting, and seeding. Additionally, you may have noticed there are now disc golf baskets located on each of the nine holes. This should increase utilization of the golf course. The disc golf installation completed under budget with volunteer labor and some assistance from the maintenance department.

**Volunteers** — As always, we recognize all the time and effort that SBC volunteers put in on committees, working on projects such as the Coquille Park building, and various other things. Our sincere thanks for all you do. Shelter Bay Community is fortunate to have so many folks that are dedicated to making Shelter Bay Community a wonderful place to live. #### Fire District 13 News

The upcoming November ballot will have Fire District Proposition 1, specifically designed to fund fire protection and emergency services. An increase is needed in property tax funds in order to:

- Purchase new firefighting apparatus to replace aging and outdated vehicles (36-year-old fire engines), thus improving effectiveness and safety for our firefighters and community.
- Maintain staffing for our 24/7 system.
- Increase staffing across our whole district for high-acuity calls (fires, car accidents, CPRs, and overlapping calls) by placing a second crew at the northern part of our district (Summit station 1).
- Stabilize operations by ensuring we have a balanced taxable base with our "not guaranteed" contributions. This allows us to continue as a fiscally conservative district with minimal to no finance debt.

Property tax dollars from Shelter Bay are paid to the Swinomish Tribal Tax Authority. Funding for the Good Morning and CARES program

(<a href="https://skagitfire13.net/community-outreach-programs">https://skagitfire13.net/community-outreach-programs</a>), unique across the nation to FD 13, has come from the Swinomish. Those tribal contributions are not guaranteed, and, for the **first time in Fire District 13 history**, the department is going to the voters for a levy lift. Because Shelter Bay property taxes aren't paid to Skagit County, your November vote on Proposition 1 is important, because that count potentially provides the Swinomish with direction on where Shelter Bay residents place priority. <a href="https://voter.votewa.gov/GenericVoterGuide.aspx?e=894&c=29#/measure/6861">https://voter.votewa.gov/GenericVoterGuide.aspx?e=894&c=29#/measure/6861</a>

#### **Compliance Corner**

Happy Fall, Shelter Bay! I hope all of you are as excited for the change in season as I am. Throughout the summer, we accomplished a ton of projects throughout the community greenbelts. As those projects slow down, I intend to work with the Swinomish Tribe to obtain SSA (Shoreline & Sensitive Area) permits so we can begin Firewise work in areas that have been neglected. Please feel free to notify me of any greenbelt areas you think need Firewise work.

Through the end of the summer, we did have several violations that escalated to levying a fine. Those fines were levied due to unkempt lots, short-term rental listings on Airbnb, dogs being off-leash, and trees being cut without the necessary permits.


The issue of feeding wildlife has also been brought to my attention recently. It is important that all residents are aware that we do <u>not</u> encourage the feeding of any wildlife, nor does the Swinomish Tribe. It is not helpful to the animals, and can cause disease, malnutrition, and other issues for these animals. The Swinomish Tribe's Wildlife Program strongly encourages the following actions to minimize wildlife disease transmission in Shelter Bay:

- 1. Secure all garbage from access by wildlife.
- 2. Avoid feeding pets outdoors.
- 3. Minimize wildlife attractants on property (fallen fruit, garden access, etc.).
- 4. Locate bird feeders so that mammals cannot access the feeders, and avoid excessive bird feed spillage.

Following the above recommendations discourages unnaturally high concentrations of animals that promote transmission among wildlife of diseases such as Adenovirus Hemorrhagic Disease and Chronic Wasting Disease. Feeding wildlife is also problematic because it can lead to wildlife malnutrition, wildlife disease transmission to people, and habituated animals that become aggressive towards people and domestic animals.

#### **Dock Notes**



As the air gets crisper and the days grow shorter, we find ourselves at a special time of year on the water. October is here, bringing with it the stunning colors of autumn and a chance to reflect on another fantastic boating season.

**Boat Watch Services:** For owners who live a long distance from the marina or plan to be away for an extended period, hiring a boat

watch service is a wise investment. While marina staff regularly monitor mooring lines, a professional boat watch service can provide a more comprehensive inspection of your vessel. These services ensure that your dehumidifiers or heaters are functioning correctly, your boat's power supply is maintained, and critical equipment such as bilge pumps are operating properly. This provides peace of mind by protecting your boat from potential damage, especially during the fall and winter months. Stop by the harbor shed for recommendations.

A Bright Idea: One of the many smart ideas our former harbormaster Vanessa had was to put a lamp in your vessel's window so that, during dock walks, marina staff will be able to make sure your vessel is getting shore power by seeing the lamp is on.

Shore Power Cords: As Steve Shipley states, "The most overlooked maintenance item on a boat is the shore power cord." Neglecting to keep your cords clean can cause resistance at the connection, which generates heat and damages the receptacle over time. This winter, marina staff will be performing checks to identify and address any overheated receptacles, but it is important for every boater to inspect their own shore power equipment regularly. Please check your cord ends for any signs of heat damage or corrosion, and ensure a tight, clean connection to prevent electrical issues.

Marina Parking Lot Garden Beds: Beginning in early October, our team will be clearing the garden beds in the center of the parking lot. This project involves leveling the beds and removing tree stumps that are currently buried beneath the beauty bark, ensuring a smoother and more visually appealing space.

#### Did You Know? - Understanding Shelter Bay's Covenants



What is a Covenant? In plain language, a covenant is an agreement.

Why should I care about the Covenants? Shelter Bay is a covenant-governed community. These covenants provide for the control of structures, improvements, and land use through the establishment of restrictions that are binding upon owners, as evidenced by their signing a property sublease with the Shelter Bay Company. As such, the covenants are a legally binding and enforceable document for residents.

Why are the Covenants necessary? Our covenants were created to preserve Shelter Bay's natural beauty, ensure high-quality improvements, and maintain or increase the value of property investments for lot owners. Many people complain about the restrictions placed on their property by the covenants, but these covenants do protect you from adverse impacts on the enjoyment of your property caused by prohibited or controlled activities on neighboring properties.

What should I do to ensure compliance with the Covenants? It is highly recommended that you read and understand the governing documents that you have agreed to be bound by, including the covenants, the rules and regulations, and other guidance documents such as committee guidelines.

Where can I find the Covenants? You can easily access the covenants online at shelterbay.net. To access a PDF of the covenants that you can either print or save, first navigate to the main page, and select the "Governance" tab. From the drop-down menu, choose "Governing Documents" then click the "View Document" button for Covenants.

Are you expected to be able to remember everything included in these documents? No, but, at a minimum, you should be aware of their existence and know where to find them for reference. Knowledge of the covenants can be helpful in avoiding or managing disputes with neighbors, and in avoiding fines for violations of the rules.

Future columns will address understanding Rules & Regs Part I, Rules & Regs Part II, members' responsibilities, and the committee guidelines for Architectural Compliance, Green Committee, and Lot Compliance – areas where residents most often interface with staff and committee members. Common issues faced when contemplating new construction, sitework, renovations, improvements (including exterior light fixtures), or repairs on your property will also be presented. Additionally, the difference between a Shelter Bay Certificate of Compliance and a Permit from the Swinomish Tribe will be discussed.


