Voting Instructions in Preparation for the Annual Membership Meeting

Annual Membership Meeting/Election
Saturday, May 16, 2026

Voting is now open for the Annual Membership meeting. You have 3 options for voting:

- 1) **Online via Vote HOA Now**
(Deadline Friday, May 15, at 4 p.m.)
- 2) **By Mail-in using the ballots in the Election Packet** (Must be received by Saturday 10:00 a.m., including those mailed via USPS or those that used the After-hours Payment Drop Box at the Office.)
- 3) **In-person day of meeting** (Must be in line (with ID) between 10:15-10:30 a.m. in the Clubhouse. As long as you are in line by 10:30 a.m., you will be allowed to vote.)



Online voting is the preferred method. It's a simple point-and-click ballot with the results automatically tabulated, providing the highest level of accuracy and security. You do not have to be signed up for electronic notices to vote electronically. **Look for instructions in the Meeting Notice mailed to you.**

The Membership Meeting will be called to order at 10 a.m., at which time it will immediately recess for in-person voting and ballot counting. It will reconvene at 1:00 p.m., Saturday, May 16, 2026, with the Election Results.

Statements Are Coming May 1, 2026

It is that time of year when **Shelter Bay Company** bills you for the annual leasehold rent required for your sublease. We will be processing automatic payments (ACH withdrawal) on May 15, 2026.

If your account is set up for ACH withdrawal, there will be a message in the upper right corner of your statement stating, **"If you are set up with auto payments, ACH, this invoice is for your records, no additional action is required."**

If you are paying Shelter Bay Company with a check, please make your Annual Sublease payment to **Shelter Bay Company**. If you make the check out to Shelter Bay Community or combine the amount with your monthly HOA Shelter Bay Community payment, the check will be returned to you for correction.

Did You Hear? SR Bridge Closure

Plan for a Detour Route

Beginning May 1, the West Division Street bridge entering downtown Mount Vernon (State Route 536) will be closed eastbound to all vehicles, with an exception for emergency response vehicles. The westbound traffic lane will remain open. WSDOT's repainting of the bridge is expected to be completed in the spring of 2027.

Greetings from your Community Manager



The maintenance team has completed work on the golf course greens, including plugging, sanding, and seeding. We should soon see the new grass sprouting and filling in bare spots. The renovated surfaces should provide a much better playing experience. We did purchase one new tee mat to ensure the fit was accurate and have now ordered the remaining eight mats. The team will be cleaning and staining all the benches. The entire area should look much better over the next month or so. The team pressure-washed the pickleball and tennis courts and started on the basketball court. They will be doing work on the road edges along Shelter Bay Drive and will be doing line-painting over the next few months. We have scheduled the ditch mowing company for the first couple of weeks of May.

The renovation of the marina parking lot median has been completed. The area looks much cleaner and is safer to walk across. As previously identified, this project was funded by the marina. Some renovations are being done in the marina bathrooms, and they should be completed soon.

Now that we are moving out of rainy weather, we should be able to begin the playground equipment replacement project soon.

As we move toward summer, we look forward to the opening of the pool for another swim season. Our maintenance team has continued to keep the pool and surrounding area clean and in good operating condition. On Friday April 17, we had our annual pool inspection and passed with flying colors. The next step is to hire pool attendants and that will be underway in May. We have not yet set an opening date, but should soon have that finalized.

I also wanted to comment on the mailbox on the outbound lane as you leave Shelter Bay. As you have all observed, that changed a few months ago when the USPS removed the mailbox that had the easy access drop slot replacing it with a typical mailbox. I have had several conversations with the folks at the post office and have also spoken to the Postmaster explaining that this has made the box hard to use and potentially hazardous. I pointed out that people either must get out of the car right at the mailbox location or park and walk over. The Postmaster advised me that the postal service is phasing out the kind of mailbox that we previously had. After reviewing the issue, she agrees that it makes it challenging and is currently trying to find another USPS-approved mailbox that has the easy access drop slot. I will continue to follow up and hope to get this taken care of soon.

In closing, I would like to thank all the Shelter Bay Staff members along with all the volunteers that work hard to make Shelter Bay a great place to live.

Lease Update

The Lease Negotiations Team, a subcommittee of Shelter Bay Company comprised of two board members and two community members, has participated in more than fifty meetings over the past year, including several with Swinomish Senators and their legal counsel. In addition to negotiating lease terms, both parties are actively working through key structural issues, such as the treatment of subleases, and whether two master leases can remain in place through 2044 when the current lease expires.

The Team recognizes the importance of securing a long-term lease option for the community as soon as possible. While we understand the desire for a defined timeline, negotiations are ongoing and complex, and it is not yet possible to provide a firm estimate for when an agreement will be finalized and ready for presentation to the community.

Rod has served on several committees not only as a Board Representative, but also as a community volunteer, with Safety/CERT being his specialty. Rod also spent several years serving on the Shelter Bay Company Lease Negotiating Team, working to bring a new Master Lease to the community. Thank you, Rod Proctor, for all you have done for the community. We appreciate your service to the Board.

The board held the monthly town hall on Sunday, April 19. Please remember these town hall meetings are at 7 p.m. each month on Sunday following the Wednesday board meeting. The town hall meetings are an open question-and-answer town hall, giving community members a chance to participate in the governing of Shelter Bay. The town halls are designed to provide more transparency to the operations of Shelter Bay. Please note that there will not be a town hall meeting in May due to the Memorial Day weekend.

May is upon us now and that means Boating Season is finally here! Your Shelter Bay Marina staff wants to wish everyone safe and adventurous times out on the water!

Projects that were wrapped up recently:

Marina garden beds were cleaned out, stumps removed and leveled with gravel. This gives our parking lot a nice clean look without all the overgrown weeds and teasels.

Marina restroom flooring was replaced and new plumbing installed for the sinks. The men's room also got new urinals. We still ask that you flush the toilets for about 5 seconds. This ensures everything is flushed away.

Parking Lot Reminders:

Vehicles parked overnight at the marina must display a parking permit decal. Marina parking includes these areas: near the boat launch & A Dock, at C/D/E Docks, and along Shoshone Drive at F-J Docks.

Parking in any shore-side spot at the marina is limited to 72 hours.

Tenants with boat trailers who use the parking area near the boat launch are required to have a trailer parking permit decal. Trailers cannot be left without a vehicle attached.

Parking permit decals can be picked up from the office. Any questions? See our staff.

MMIWP (Missing and Murdered Indigenous Women, Girls and Two Spirit Peoples)



You may notice the red dresses displayed around the Swinomish Village in early May. Perhaps, you felt sensitivity or curiosity about what they might mean. They signify and honor the lives of those who have disappeared or have even been murdered.

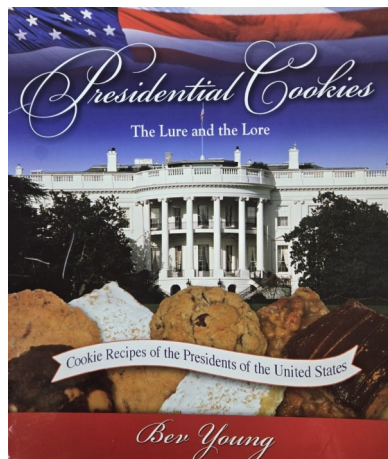
The community is encouraged to join in the Swinomish Indian Tribe's March and Healing Dinner on Tuesday, May 5, **Red Dress Day**. Participants will meet at Swinomish Village's John K. Bob Ball Field for the MMIWP group march at 4:30 p.m. Afterward, all will gather at the Boys & Girls Club, for a healing dinner at 6 p.m.

This event honors families and people directly affected by this widespread human rights crisis which reaches across North America. Many of the missing people have been taken from Alaska and brought to Seattle, WA. They are forced into a life of drugs and violence. This affects indigenous people at astoundingly high rates.

Much of the community advocacy that highlights awareness can eventually lead to change in policy. It can also bring attention to the crisis in the hopes of preventing more Native people from ever having to be affected by this again. Sadly, it is still under-documented, which means that there are many thousands more cases that are not officially recorded. Unfortunately, this is still an ongoing crisis. That is just one of many reasons why awareness is so crucial.

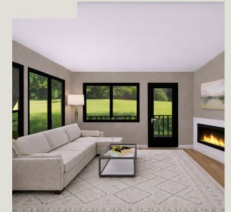
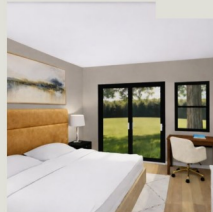

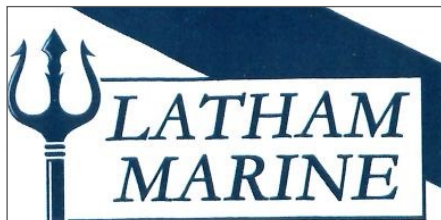
