Ways to Pay Your Shelter Bay Bills

- **ACH Debit** – Automated Clearing House is an electronic funds transfer system that allows Shelter Bay to automatically withdraw funds from your bank account on the 15th of each month to pay your monthly account balance. There is no cost to you for this service. ACH is Shelter Bay's preferred payment method as it is the least costly to both you and the community. Please contact the office for an authorization form if you are interested in this "set it and forget it" option. Plus, it is the safest of all of the choices to pay your bills.
- **PayLease** – This feature can be accessed via your online account through the Pitera Communications Portal by clicking "Make a Payment" under the Financials Tab. You can choose to pay by E-Check, where your bank sends an electronic check on that day from your bank account – there is a \$3.04 fee for this payment method. You can also choose to pay using a debit card for a \$8.19 fee, or using a credit card by initiating the payment either by making a one-time payment or scheduling recurring payments – there is a \$3.04 fee plus 3.74% transaction charge for this payment method. If you have not signed up for access, contact the office for instructions. It's easy!
- **Online Bill Pay** – This option is available through your bank's online account. This is not an electronic payment; a paper check is issued by your bank. Please be aware that bank processing times vary with this method and it can take up to 10 days for the payment to reach your Shelter Bay account; plan accordingly!
- **Personal Check** – Shelter Bay will also accept your personal check for bill payment. Manually processing checks is a time-consuming process for staff, whether sent by the member or the member's bank. Remember that increased operating costs impact every member's dues. Personal checks are not a secure method of payment as they contain your bank routing and account number information as well as your name, address, and sometimes even phone number and driver's license information. With incidents of mail theft increasing, putting a personal check in an envelope, then into your mailbox, then lifting the red flag for the postal carrier provides an opportunity for someone to use your personal information for nefarious purposes. Payment by personal check is Shelter Bay's least preferred payment method.

Greetings from your Interim Community Manager



We are one month into the new fiscal year, and many of our planned projects are either underway or about to begin.

This month, you should see the completion of the golf course improvements, including the removal of the old chain link fence, installation of a new wood fence, and an updated golf bulletin board. These improvements will provide a cleaner, more attractive appearance from both sides of the fence.

The maintenance building at the corner of Shelter Bay Drive and Shoshone will receive a fresh coat of paint. The new playground project is expected to begin by the end of the month; paving projects will be underway; the new greens mower will be in service; road striping will be completed; and several additional projects will continue behind the scenes. Investing in our infrastructure helps reduce long-term maintenance costs while ensuring our community amenities remain safe, functional, and enjoyable for everyone.

E-Bikes: A Community Reminder

One topic that has generated considerable discussion recently is the use of e-bikes in Shelter Bay. Whether you ride an e-bike or simply share the roads with those who do, it's important to understand the rules.

Children have always enjoyed riding bicycles in our community. However, the growing popularity of e-bikes has introduced higher speeds, which naturally raises new safety concerns. Class 1 and Class 2 e-bikes are generally treated the same as traditional bicycles under Washington law, and there is no minimum age requirement to operate them. Riders must obey the same traffic laws as cyclists, including stopping at stop signs, yielding when required, using hand signals when turning, and following posted speed limits.

Parents, if your children ride e-bikes in Shelter Bay, please take time to review the rules of the road with them. Help ensure they understand the importance of riding responsibly and staying within posted speed limits. Side roads in Shelter Bay have a 20-mph speed limit, and the maximum speed limit anywhere within the community is 25 mph.

As a community, we want to encourage our children to go outside, stay active, and enjoy all that Shelter Bay has to offer. At the same time, advances in technology bring new responsibilities. By respecting the rules of the road, showing consideration for others, and following our HOA regulations, we can create a safe environment where everyone can enjoy our community together.

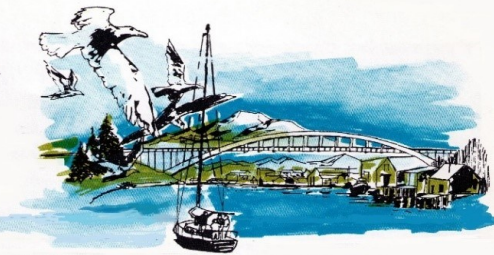

Dock Notes



Welcome to the peak of summer! August is here with warm weather, bright sunny days, and plenty of time to enjoy out on the water.

A few reminders of our marina rules -

Storage on Docks and Finger Floats: Vessel owners, operators, crew, or guests using the marina are required to keep their vessel, the dock, and the finger pier neat, clean, and orderly.

Rafting: Rafting of boats (including a dinghy or tender) is prohibited.

Discharge of Sewage: Discharge of sewage from vessels in the marina or harbor areas is strictly prohibited. Violations will be reported to the Washington State Department of Ecology for appropriate action as provided by law.

Vessel Maintenance: Repair work of outfitting, spray painting, sandblasting, chipping, sanding, welding, or burning on vessels is not permitted without specific approval of the Community Manager. All work must be in compliance with applicable local, state, and federal regulations governing those activities.

All private contractors working on vessels shall register with the office and provide proof of insurance, licensing, and bonding before commencing work.

Boat Launch Reminder: During low tides, launching or trailering your boat at our ramp can be difficult. If you return to the marina and cannot trailer your boat due to the tide, **please contact the Harbormaster at (360) 333-2952**. Please **do not** moor your boat in an apparently empty slip. We will find a temporary spot to accommodate you until the tide returns.

Vessel Registration: If you have not displayed your 2027 vessel registration sticker on your boat, please do so. Also, update your registration with the main office. Failure to do so can result in fines.

Bright Days Ahead: Investing in Our Community's Financial Future



We are thrilled to announce that our community is taking a major step toward long-term financial security and sustainability with the

installation of four new solar projects on our community buildings. While these projects represent a noticeable upfront commitment, they are an exceptionally high-yield investment of our capital, made possible by a rare federal funding opportunity. By utilizing the Inflation Reduction Act (IRA) tax credits available to non-profits, we secured significant federal subsidies to heavily discount our initial costs. Three of our upcoming systems – the **Clubhouse**, the **Marina Restrooms**, and the **Wastewater Treatment Plant** – qualified for a 50% Elective Pay direct reimbursement from the federal government, while the **RV Storage Lot** system qualified for a 40% federal reimbursement. By acting now, we are locking in our energy costs and protecting the community from unpredictable utility rate increases, ensuring our neighborhood remains both fiscally responsible and highly desirable.

To address understandable questions about the scale of this expenditure, the data shows that these systems will rapidly pay for themselves well within our current planning horizons, accounting for the remaining time on our current master lease, directly reducing every member's monthly operating assessment. Here is how the individual investments break down:

- **RV Storage Lot (133.35 kW):** Offsets 103% of usage; costs \$196,735 after incentives. It achieves full return on investment (ROI) in just 6 years, boasting a 21.5% internal rate of return (IRR) and an estimated \$1.4M in savings over 30 years.
- **Wastewater Treatment Plant (71.12 kW):** Offsets 101% of usage; costs \$123,145 after incentives. It features a 7-year ROI and a 17.6% IRR, yielding \$737K in 30-year savings.
- **Clubhouse (43.5 kW):** Offsets 82% of usage; costs \$61,726 after incentives. It carries a quick 5-year ROI and a 23.2% IRR, saving \$491K over 30 years.
- **Marina Restrooms (13.25 kW):** Offsets 90% of usage; costs \$23,596 after incentives. It reaches full ROI in 8 years with a 16.4% IRR, resulting in \$130K in savings over 30 years.

Even looking strictly at the 2044 lease expiration, each system will have completely paid for itself and spent 7 to 10 full years generating large net-positive savings for our operating budget. Over the full 30-year lifespan of the panels, the combined projects will save our community more than \$2.8 million in electricity costs. This initiative is a prime example of smart asset management, protecting Shelter Bay against future utility rate hikes and strengthening our community's financial health for decades to come.

Note: estimates are based on an anticipated utility rate increase of 5% per year. Recent years have seen higher than 5% increases, but we expect that to slow down at some point in the future. All estimates are subject to change over the life of the project.

Water Conservation Request

The City of Anacortes and Skagit Public Utility District are asking customers to voluntarily reduce water use by 10% as water flow conditions in the Skagit River are low. As Shelter Bay receives its water from the same facility, through the Town of La Conner, we are asking our residents to assist in these efforts.

This is a seasonal situation which can also be affected by low snowpack. This past winter there were almost no snow events and that will therefore also affect water levels this summer.

Ways you can practice conservation:

- Install water-efficient fixtures
- Reuse produce (lettuce, etc.) rinse water for plants and gardens
- Check for and fix leaks (running toilets and dripping faucets or hoses)
- Shorten showers and don't leave water running while brushing teeth/shaving, etc.
- Only wash full loads (dishes and laundry)
- Use mulch (retains moisture in the soil)
- Choose native plants (opt for drought-resistant plants that require less water)
- Limit lawn & flowerbed watering to early mornings and late evenings to reduce evaporation
- Weeds also drink water, so remove weeds from beds and around home and yard (this also reduces fire risk)
- Do not wash your car at home (most car washes have a way to recycle water)

Conservation is a long game that we win by making small changes to our daily habits. Start with the simple steps.

SRC Yoga



Shelter Bay's Tuesday yoga classes at Coquille Park were introduced to the community on a balmy summer morning, with the French doors wide open to the outdoors. Experienced leader Kim Robinson, kimmyyoga@gmail.com, introduced her style of yoga practice as a blend of the many types offered. The root word of yoga is "to yoke" or "to unite": bringing things together.

She explained establishing four corner contact points of each foot on the mat. We began the session with intentional breathwork, which then led into exploring gentle poses, thus encouraging the breath, rather than the muscles, to deepen into each pose. Kim infused playfulness when she led the class through *Lion's Breath*, and later a *Whale's Tail* pose targeting the glutes and providing a piriformis stretch.

Yoga classes are one of the newest additions to the *Shelter Bay Social & Rec* sponsored selection of community-produced exercise offerings. All levels of experience are welcome to drop-in. Bring your floor mat, along with a lightweight blanket to assist with poses. If you have yoga blocks to use, bring those. The class meets every **Tuesday at Coquille Park Building, 10 a.m.**
